THE CALL

PREPARATION:

- Read Chapter 1, pages 13–15, "The Call", in "Stewardship, A Disciple's Response."
- Read the suggested Scripture passages shown in this chapter.

Gathering and Opening Prayer

- · Participants gather around a Bible and a lighted candle.
- Open in prayer by singing a hymn that is known to your group or by praying Psalm 139:1-6 together.

Lord, you have examined me and you know me. You know everything I do; from far away you understood all my thoughts. You see me, whether I am working or resting; you know all my actions. Even before I speak, you already know what I will say. You are all around me on every side; you protect me with your power. Your knowledge of me is too deep; it is beyond my understanding. —Psalm 139:1-6

The Word of God

Read aloud one of the following Scripture passages:

Mark 1:16-20 The call of the first disciples

John 1:35-42 The first disciples Acts 9:1-19 Saul's conversion

Take a few moments for silent reflection, and then share your thoughts on the following questions:

- 1. How is the call to be a disciple personal? How is the call to be a disciple communal?
- 2. Is there a difference between being a disciple and being a church member?
- 3. Describe your own call to follow Jesus. Did it take place at a specific moment or over a period of time?

Studying the Pastoral Letter: "Stewardship, A Disciple's Response"

After reading Chapter 1, pages 13–15, please share your reflections and insights on the following questions:

- 1. "Christians must be stewards of their personal vocations." What does this phrase mean to you? Describe your "personal vocation."
- 2. What is the "cost of discipleship" where you live and work?
- 3. How is Christian Stewardship much more than the sharing of time, talent and treasure?

In light of our study of the selections from the Scriptures and Chapter 1 of the Pastoral Letter on Stewardship, suggest some positive steps toward making Stewardship more a part of day-to-day life as a Catholic. Use the suggested 3-step process.

-STEP PROCESS

- 1. In sacred silence, allow the Holy Spirit to teach your heart and to guide your actions.
- 2. Identify where in your work, relationships, or personal time you are challenged to apply what you have learned in this session.
- 3. Write a few words as a reminder to yourself.

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Reflection Notes

Closing with Ritual Prayer

A reading from the First Letter of St. Peter:

Beloved: Come to him, a living stone, rejected by human beings but chosen and precious in the sight of God, and like living stones, let yourselves be built into a spiritual house to be a holy priesthood to offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ... You are "a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people of his own, so that you may announce the praises" of him who called you out of darkness into his wonderful light. — 1Peter 2:4-5, 9

Silent Reflection

Using the lighted candle, each participant presents the candle to another and says to that person:

You were called out of darkness into God's wonderful light.

The person receiving the lighted candle answers:

Amen.

Take a moment of silence.

As a group, pray either the *Lord's Prayer* or the *Steward's Prayer* (found on the inside front cover).
